This goal has been a central focus and we are currently in the process of reviewing our pedagogical approach and practices. These include the implementation of Clarity and Learning Alliance from Catholic Education NT, understanding how students learn based on the work of Science of Learning. Additionally, we are reviewing other successful systems and schools, with a particular focus on those in the Canberra and Goulburn Diocese.

Strategic Direction: We are a small school with a big heart, and we aspire to authentically live out our Catholic identity.

We will: By the end of 2024 have embedded a culture of faith filled, respectful and resilient learners. This will be reflected in an increase of Love One Another awards, the establishment of a School Choir and the implementation of a Pastoral Care and Wellbeing program in all classes.

To achieve this goal, we have identified four key projects: the Art Show, School Choir, SWPB Policy and Framework House Identity. While all projects are essential, our primary focus has been on the Art Show, and we are pleased to report that we are on track to achieve this milestone.

Three key projects—our Literacy Policy, Promotion of Literacy across the SH Community, and professional learning opportunities for staff—are driving our progress. These initiatives, coupled with our commitment to fostering a culture of Literacy within and beyond our school community, are laying a solid foundation for student success. We remain steadfast in our dedication to ensuring that every student achieves a year's worth of growth in Literacy, and we will continue to monitor our efforts closely to ensure success.

Attendance

I would like to remind everyone of the importance of attending school each day. Regular attendance is essential for your child to succeed academically and socially. By attending school regularly, they will have the opportunity to develop important skills, build strong relationships with teachers and peers, and gain a sense of belonging within our school community. Of course, we understand that there may be times when your child is unable to attend due to illness or other circumstances, and we do ask that if they are sick, they stay home. As a school our aim is to have an attendance rate of 90% or above and I am pleased to report we are at an attendance rate of 91% for the year. Well done to everyone!

This change stems from the insights of our Teaching Team, which, after thorough research into best practices, concluded that certain Literacy components must be explicitly taught for students to flourish. Literacy is the cornerstone of education, enabling students to engage fully within the curriculum. Since the implementation of the Literacy Block we have seen some remarkable results with almost all students demonstrating significant progress in their reading abilities. We take immense pride in their dedication to enhancing their literacy skills. It's also essential to acknowledge the extraordinary commitment of our Teachers and ISAs who play a pivotal part in our student's development.



Families are a child's 'first teacher'. Reading together for just 20 minutes five times a week can significantly enhance their learning experience and academic growth!



In History, we studied the early way of life of First Nations Australians. Miss Tandy visited to share some knowledge about her culture.

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




In Maths, we've been engaging in fun measurement activities. We can identify the terms perimeter, area and mass.



GRADE 5/6 Room 11 and 12

ENGLISH

This term, we are focusing on narrative writing – writing and reading texts that are entertaining. Students are working on making their writing more interesting. We have been studying new words during our daily reviews and exploring compound and complex sentences.

We have started reading 'Holes' as our novel study. We have been exploring the different characters and settings. The students are very eager to read on and find out what happens at Camp Green Lake.

MATHS

In Maths, we are learning how to solve problems involving the four operations – addition, subtraction, multiplication and division.

Students are learning different strategies they can use and working on fluency for problems involving single digit numbers.

Next, we will explore fractions, decimals and percentages.

INQUIRY

Last term in Science, students learnt about the states of matter and reversible and irreversible changes. This term, we are learning about the properties of the states so we are conducting a variety of experiments.

Our topic for HASS is Civics and Citizenship. We are learning all about Australia's democracy and government.






intervention and inclusion

MiniLit

This program is a Tier 2 Small group intervention for years 1 & 2, done outside of the classroom. The program provides explicit instruction in phonemic awareness, systematic synthetic phonics for reading and spelling, letter formation, and connected text reading.





MacqLif Synthetic phonics.

Reading Tutor Reading Tutor Program caters for Students who have not fully acquired the basic skills needed to become functional readers. Children who have struggled to learn to read in the first few years of schooling need intensive, schooling need intensive, systematic reading 1:1 instruction if they are not to fall further behind.





Quicksmart Maths

The QuickSmart Numeracy intervention program focuses on understanding and recall of basic number facts, performance of elementary calculations, acquisition of appropriate Mathematics language, and problem-solving skills.

Auslan

Students have continued learning Australian Sign
Language, known as Auslan, this term. They have revised
everything they learnt with Miss Tandy in Term 1 and
have enjoyed building on their knowledge and
communicating with this visual language. The younger
students have been practising their alphabet, greetings
and colours, and are currently learning how to sign the
story 'Where is the Green Sheep?' by Mem Fox.
The older students have been learning about Auslan
culture and have started an inquiry project into an area
of interest in Auslan.

Finger-Spelling

When encountering a word that lacks a specific sign in Auslan, including names, we employ 'finger spelling.' This involves manually signing the letters of the alphabet to spell out the word.

Context counts

Did you know that not every word in English has an Auslan equivalent? While Auslan is rich and expressive, there are no specific signs for common English words like 'as' and 'is.' Instead of finger-spelling these words, Auslan users rely on context to convey their meaning.

Technologies

Transition/Year 1

Room 9 has been learning how to safely use technology, and what it means to work on and offline. They have learnt about what a computer is, and different machines that have computers within them. From here they have learnt that all computers have hardware and software. They have explored both components within an iPad. Room 9 is beginning to create their own device with chosen software.

Year 3 and Year 4

students have developed an understanding of the Binary code. They have used their knowledge to convert bitmaps into binary, and binary into bitmaps. Students have begun investigating algorithms and programming. They are designing and constructing a course challenge for a Beebot. They then are considering the algorithmic solution to this task to test whether their challenge is achievable and to debug along the Way.









Year 1 /Year 2

Students have used iPads to understand information that can be stored on devices. They explored what information is safe to share online. Students have developed an understanding of What a computer is, their purpose and what devices are computers. They have used QR codes to access information, and explored the different hardware and software used in this process. Students are creating digital art, identifying the purpose of the hardware and software being used.

Year 5 and Year 6

Students continue to explore and understand Binary as a computer language. They use this knowledge to create and crack codes. Students were then able to use this knowledge to create simple black and white grid pixels. They have explored that digital colour images are a combination of red, blue and green light. Students have experimented with a variety of bits per pixel to alter colour. Students have created colour grid pixel art on code.org.

Sensory tray







Sensory trays are great for developing fine motor skills, cognitive skill and also boost social skills. The children loved our ANZAC themed tray.

Not only did the children help to make the Playdough, they also explored different parts of ANZAC Day through 'conversation starter' mats. During the making of the Playdough the children also explored mathematical concepts such as capacity, measurement, counting, communication and problem solving whilst following instruction such as the playdough recipe.





Social and emotional











Small and large group play, role play (themed by children's interests, such as shop keeper, babies, barbies and dress ups) and having lots of fun together are the ways we developed our social and emotional skills.









We spoke about the change in the weather and what the season is called in the Larrakia calendar. The children learnt the names of the seasons and were very excited to point out familiar animals on the wall such as Damibilla "Barramundi" and bush fruit. Wheels day was a roaring success as usual with children consolidating their gross motor skills whilst having a lot of

We also caught up with Saint Paul's OSHC, continuing to strengthen children's relationships as well as share a picnic lunch.

The children helped to tie dye 50 bags blue for Autism NT. These bags will go out at a Bunnings function to spread information and knowledge to the public about Autism.













We continued to care for our garden; using the recycled water but we also planted more rheo's (Green and purple plants) in the front garden. The children helped to finish the second recycled, portable garden bed, ready for the Dry season's planting.
