#### **Annual School Improvement Plan Update:**

The following information provides an update on how we as a school community are tracking in achieving our three Annual School Improvement Plan goals for 2024.

We are a small school with a big heart, and we aspire to be a community of inspired and inspiring educators.

**We will:** By the end of 2024, implement and embed a whole school pedagogical approach and teaching practice.

At Sacred Heart, our Professional Learning Communities are exploring High Impact Teaching Strategies, while our staff meetings have focused on the Science of Learning and Quality Assessment Informs Instruction as part of the Learning Alliance Parameter 3. A study proposal has been submitted to Catholic Education NT for 2-3 staff members to visit the Canberra and Goulburn Diocese to assess their impact on student reading results.

We are on track to achieve our goal, with Term 3 focused on drafting an approach and policy for teaching at Sacred Heart. These efforts reflect our firm commitment to enhancing educational practices and fostering a community of inspired educators dedicated to student success.

Strategic Direction: We are a small school with a big heart, and we aspire to authentically live out our Catholic identity.

We will: By the end of 2024 have embedded a culture of faith filled, respectful and resilient learners. This will be reflected in an increase of Love One Another awards, the establishment of a School Choir and the implementation of a Pastoral Care and Wellbeing program in all classes.

On Friday, May 24, we held a successful art show with over 250 attendees, receiving supportive and affirming feedback. Based on our school motto, the show's theme enhanced our Catholic Identity and allowed students to express their understanding creatively. Additionally, we have established a School Choir under the leadership of Ms. Ebony Maxwell, with over 20 students participating across all years. Our Pastoral Care and Wellbeing PLC is exploring strategies for implementing a Pastoral Care and Wellbeing program in each classroom based on our School-Wide Positive Behaviors, with recommendations expected early in Term 3.

We have already achieved a key target of this goal, and other focus areas are on track to be achieved by the end of 2024.

Strategic Direction: We are a small school with a big heart, and we aspire to be an inclusive and intentional learning community.

We will: By the end of 2024, embed practices to support students to achieve a year's worth of growth for a year's worth of learning in Literacy.

We are delighted to share that our collective efforts have led to significant improvements in our intervention programs and student achievements, particularly in Oral Reading Fluency (ORF). The class averages have surged by 20-30 words per minute since the start of the year, with a remarkable growth in student accuracy. This is evident in Year 5 and 6 students, who have achieved an impressive 90% reading accuracy or higher.

Our commitment to Literacy promotion remains steadfast as we eagerly anticipate exciting announcements in Term 3. We have actively participated in National Simultaneous Storytime and the Chief Minister's Reading Challenge, furthering our dedication to Literacy.

A draft of the Literacy Policy and Framework and an Intervention Policy and Framework will be presented to the School Board early in Term 3. These initiatives, coupled with our dedication to fostering a culture of Literacy, are laying a solid foundation for student success.

We remain steadfast in ensuring every student achieves a year's worth of growth in Literacy, and we will continue to monitor our efforts closely to ensure success.

#### E-Safety

#### Help Your Children Safely Navigate Their Digital World

Supporting and guiding your children in their online activities can help them make safe and sound decisions. Here are three key strategies:

#### 1. Be Engaged, Open, and Supportive

- Get Involved: Spend online time with your children as part of family activities. Play games together and discuss favourite apps, games, or websites.
- Maintain Open Communication: Regularly ask about their online experiences, who they are interacting with, and any issues they may face.
- Provide Reassurance: Let your children know they can always come to you with any concerns without fear of losing internet access. This assurance encourages open communication.
- Monitor Behaviour: Be attentive to any changes in your child's behaviour or mood. If concerned, consider professional help from a GP, psychologist, or school counsellor.

#### 2. Set Some Rules

Age-Appropriate Guidelines: Establish rules for device usage and online access that suit your child's age, with clear consequences for breaking them.

- Involve Your Child: Engage your child in creating these rules to help them understand the risks. Review and adjust rules together as they grow.
- Family Tech Agreement: Create a written agreement outlining how devices like smartphones, tablets, computers, TVs, and gaming consoles are used in your home. Display it prominently, such as on the fridge.
- Content and Behaviour: The agreement should cover acceptable websites, time spent online, and online behaviour.
- Templates and Contracts: Use downloadable templates for younger children and resources like the Family Online Safety Contract from ThinkUKnow for older kids.
- Consequences: Clearly define consequences for breaking rules, negotiated with your child so they are meaningful.
- Parental Rules: Set and follow your own rules to model desired behaviour.

#### 3. Use Technology and Get Information

- Familiarise with Devices: Understand the devices your children use and set them up for privacy and online safety.
- Parental Controls: Use parental controls to monitor and limit screen time and content access according to your child's age and experience.
- Careful Selection: Choose apps and games wisely, checking age ratings and reviews on the App Store or Google Play. Utilize resources like the Australian Classification Board's database.
- Ongoing Education: Stay informed with resources such as Children and Media Australia and Common Sense Media for age-specific advice on apps, games, and websites.

#### Advice for Different Age Groups

#### Under 5s

Online activities can enhance learning and social skills but also pose risks if unsupervised. Here's how to ensure safe digital experiences for young children:

- Supervise Closely: Explore and play online content together with your child.
- Age-Appropriate Content: Ensure content is suitable for their age.
- Balance Activities: Limit online time to maintain a healthy balance with physical activities.
- Early Conversations: Start discussing safe and respectful online behaviour early.
- Tech Tips for Parents of Preschoolers:
- Secure Your Devices: Protect your devices with passwords or pins.
- Set Parental Controls: Restrict content to pre-approved apps and sites, expanding access as they grow.
- Healthy Screen Time: Refer to resources like Raising Children Network for guidelines on screen time and quality media choices for ages 2-5.

By actively engaging, setting clear rules, and utilising technology wisely, you can help your children navigate their digital world safely and confidently.


# **YEAR 3/4 ROOM 5**








In English, we have been reviewing all the tricky words we have learned. practising spelling words with short and long vowel sounds, and revisiting the doubling rule.

# LITERACY

Year 5/6 students have been exploring narratives this term. Students will demonstrate proficiency in crafting diverse, well-organised sentences and coherent paragraphs. Moreover, they will exhibit the ability to compose imaginative fictional narratives incorporating intricate settings, characters, and plots. Students have achieved the following objectives:

- Effectively develop, compose, assess and present narratives.
- Comprehend the components of a sentence.
- Employ figurative language aptly.
- Incorporate, comprehend and apply Greek and Latin root words.
- Accurately utilise a variety of suffixes and prefixes.

## NUMERACY

In Maths, students have explored a range of mathematical concepts, including operations, fractions, mapping, angles and time. By participating in interactive activities, cooperative assignments and practical scenarios, students enhanced their comprehension of these subjects and refined their problem-solving and critical thinking abilities.

## RELIGION

Students are expected to comprehend and articulate the concepts of covenant and creed. They can evaluate instances of covenant within Biblical narratives and the significance of creeds in encapsulating fundamental Christian doctrines.

# TRANSITION/ ONE

ROOM 9 CREATED THEIR OWN IPADS, SELECTING AND DESCRIBING THE HARDWARE AND SOFTWARE THEY HAD CHOSEN FOR THEIR DEVICE. THEY ARE LEARNING ABOUT DATA AND HOW IT CAN BE REPRESENTED WITH WORDS AND PICTURES. STUDENTS ARE LEARNING TO INTERPRET AND CREATE DATA ABOUT THEIR FAMILY MEMBERS USING PICTURES. FOR EXAMPLE, STUDENTS DREW THEMSELVES WITH THE NUMBER OF BALLOONS TO REPRESENT THEIR AGE. THEY SHARED THEIR DATA AND INTERPRETED DATA FROM THEIR PEERS.

## ONE/ TWO

STUDENTS LEARNT TO IDENTIFY AND DESCRIBE COMMON DIGITAL SYSTEMS. THEY USED THE IPAD AND THE APPLICATION FREEFORM TO CREATE DIGITAL ARTWORK USING A VARIETY OF FEATURES. STUDENTS ARE LEARNING TO REPRESENT DATA USING PICTURES, SYMBOLS, NUMBERS AND WORDS. THEY ARE REPRESENTING DATA ABOUT THEMSELVES ON A GLYPH.

### THREE/ FOUR

STUDENTS CONTINUED TO CONSTRUCT A COURSE WITH MULTIPLE CHALLENGES FOR A BEE-BOT TO COMPLETE. THEY CREATE ALGORITHMS AND CODED SOLUTIONS INTO THE BEE-BOTS. STUDENTS WERE REQUIRED TO PROBLEM SOLVE AND DERUG AS CHALLENGES AROSE. MANY COURSES ENDED WITH THE BEEBOT POPPING A BALLOON. STUDENTS ARE STARTING TO EXPLORE AND DESCRIBE A RANGE OF DIGITAL SYSTEMS AND THEIR PERIPHERALS TO CREATE DATA. THEY ARE CREATING VORIOUS TYPES OF DATA ON THEIR FAVOURITE ANIMAL USING DIFFERENT DIGITAL DEVICES. STUDENTS ARE LEARNING TO TRANSMIT DATA BETWEEN DIGITAL SYSTEMS.

## FIUE/ SIX

PIXEL ART ON GOOGLE SHEETS. THEY DESIGNED THEIR IMAGE, PROGRAMMED THE REQUIRED COLOURS INTO GOOGLE SHEETS AND CREATED AN IMAGE. STUDENTS WERE ABLE TO REMOVE THE VISIBLE CODING AND LINES ON THEIR ARTWORKS. STUDENTS HAVE BEGUN A SERIES OF LESSONS ON PROGRAMMING USING SCRATCH. EACH LESSON WILL FOCUS ON A NEW SKILL. STUDENTS HAVE USED SEQUENCING, EVENTS AND LOOPS TO ANIMATE THEIR NAME IN SCRATCH.

### Holiday Care - Booking Form

Welcome to Sacred Heart Catholic School Out of School Hours Care - Holiday Care Children have the freedom to make choices and educators collaborate with them to provide and build on life skills. We take every opportunity to ensure that play and leisure activities are meaningful, and all individual interests are explored. Adhering to the National Quality Standards, and utilising the My Time, Our Place Framework ensures agency, learning and wellbeing are nurtured and children grow.

We endeavor to provide a well-organised and safe program that is a collaboration of children's interests and input. We will include a variety of activities on those days: cooking, craft and sports, indoor and outdoor place spaces. Where possible we will have incursions or excursions.

#### Operating Hours: 7:00am to 5:30pm

All children must have a completed booking form and an up-to-date enrolment form to attend Holiday Care.

Fees: Holiday Care is charged at a rate of \$70 per day or \$300 for the full week. \$15 extra is charged for an excursion day. A \$50 booking fee applies, and this fee must be paid in full at the time of booking. All fees must be up to date.

#### Child Care Subsidy

CCS will not pay for any booked days when child/ren have not physically attended the service for the first time for the current enrolment period.

Government regulations require that parents/guardians approve their holiday care enrolment on myGov for each holiday period. We recommend that you check your myGov account for approval otherwise FULL FEES WILL APPLY.





### FACT SHEET FOR PARENTS, GUARDIANS AND CARERS

#### WHAT IS THE NCCD?

The Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD) takes place every year.

The NCCD is a collection that counts:

- the number of school students receiving an adjustment or 'help' due to disability
- the level of adjustment they are receiving to access education on the same basis as other students.

Students are counted in the NCCD if they receive ongoing adjustments at school due to disability. This 'help' allows them to access education on the same basis as a child without disability. The NCCD uses the definition of disability in the *Disability Discrimination Act* 1992.

Schools provide this information to education authorities.

Go to What is a reasonable adjustment? below to learn about adjustments.

# WHY IS THIS DATA BEING COLLECTED?

All schools in Australia must collect information about students with disability.

#### The NCCD:

- ensures that the information collected is transparent, consistent and reliable
- provides better information that improves understanding of students with disability
- allows parents, guardians, carers, teachers, principals, education authorities and government to better support students with disability.

### Student with disability loading

Funding from the Australian Government for students with disability is based on the NCCD through the student with disability loading.

Students with disability who are counted in the top three levels of the NCCD (extensive, substantial and supplementary) attract the loading. Funding is based on a per-student amount at each of the three levels of additional support. The amount of the loading reflects the level of support students with disability need to participate fully in school, with higher funding for those who need higher levels of support.

Australian Government recurrent school funding is provided as a lump sum to school authorities including state and territory governments, which can then distribute the funding to their member schools according to their own needs-based arrangements.

The Government expects schools and school systems to consider their funding from all sources (ie Australian Government, state and territory and private) and prioritise their spending to meet the educational needs of all of their students, including students with disability.

# WHAT ARE THE BENEFITS OF THE NCCD FOR STUDENTS?

The information collected by the NCCD helps teachers, principals, education authorities and governments to better support students with disability at school.

The NCCD encourages schools to review their learning and support systems and processes. This helps schools to continually improve education outcomes for all students.
